A Legacy of Compassion (Since 1986) Under the spiritual guidance of **Shri Ram Kumar Das Kothari Ji**, our Trust has served as a sanctuary for the ailing and abandoned sadhus and elderly of Ayodhya for nearly 40 years. Our mission is rooted in the belief that no individual, regardless of their renunciation of worldly ties, should face illness or old age without dignity and medical support.

Over the decades, our work has been recognized and blessed by venerable saints, including:

Current Impact & The Need for Scaling To date, the Trust has operated solely on the strength of community donations, managing 18–20 in-patients at any given time. The Trust has helped close to **7000 In-patients** with all types of medical situations including complex cases, including **T.B, Leprosy, Tumors, Cancer, Fractures of hand/leg/hip, gangrene, different type of infections, life-saving amputations, post-surgical recovery, chronic respiratory ailments, and palliative care**. Considering medical camps and medicine distribution, trust has impacted close to **60000 Out-patients**. However, as Ayodhya's population and spiritual footfall grow, our current resources are stretched thin.

The Vision: A 100-Bed Integrated Healthcare Facility To meet this rising demand, we are expanding our facility into a comprehensive **100-bed center**, structured as follows:

- **40-Bed Specialized Infirmary & Diagnostic Center:** Focused on acute medical care and surgical recovery.
- **60-Bed Geriatric Home (Vridhashram):** Dedicated to long-term residential care for destitute sadhus and the elderly.

Project Financials:

- **One-time Capital Expenditure (CAPEX):** Appx. ₹15 Crores (Construction & Medical Equipment).
- **Annual Operational Expenditure (OPEX):** Appx. ₹3.5 Crores – ₹4 Crores.

Our Impact: A Year of Healing in Ayodhya (2024–2025)

In the past year, our Trust has served as a critical lifeline for those abandoned by society. Our core work includes:

- **Comprehensive Clinical Care:** We treated **115 critical cases**, providing everything from advanced diagnostics (MRI, CT Scans) to life-saving surgeries and long-term post-surgical recovery.
- **Essential Support for the Destitute:** Beyond medical care, we provided food, blankets, and groceries to those in need, including serving meals to **1,500 elderly individuals**.
- **Community Outreach:** We conducted free medical camps and maintained a street-level presence in Ayodhya. Our rescue team actively brings patients found on the streets directly to our center for immediate care.
- **Compassionate Care for Animals:** Our mission extends to treating sick cows, ensuring all life in our vicinity is treated with dignity.

Since Inception Trust has helped nearly **6000 In-Patients** with medical treatment and recovery and close to **70000 Out-patients** with camps & medicine distribution

The Challenges We Face

Despite our dedication, we operate under significant strain:

- **Identification Gaps:** Many of the sadhus we serve lack government IDs like Aadhar cards, making them ineligible for government schemes like *Ayushman Bharat*.
- **Infrastructure Limitations:** Ayodhya has limited specialized facilities. Urgent cases often face long waiting lists at government hospitals, forcing us to transport patients to Lucknow, which adds heavy logistical and financial strain.
- **Financial Constraints:** While we can manage roughly **18–20 patients per month** with community donations, the cost of just one or two complex cases can run into lakhs, forcing us to limit new admissions.
- **Long Duration Care** – Some of the cases require months of care (2 to 12 months) rather than just a few days in a hospital

How Corporates Can Partner With Us

We invite corporate partners to help us scale our impact through two primary channels:

1. Capital Expenditure (CAPEX) Support

- **Facility Expansion:** Help us acquire land and build new wards to increase our capacity.
- **Branding & Legacy:** You can sponsor a specific wing or ward, which will be named after your organization to create a lasting social footprint in Ayodhya.

2. Operational Expenditure (OPEX) Support

- **Sustained Funding:** Provide fixed annual grants or pledge support for a specific number of patients each year.
- **Residential & Logistical Care:** Cover the long-term residential costs for the elderly or sponsor essential services like ambulances and the salaries of medical assistants.

Real-Life Examples of Our Work:

Case 1: Recovery from Severe Gangrene

- **Patient:** Shri Charusheela Sharan Ji (80 years old).
- **Condition:** Suffered from a severe case of **Gangrene** in the leg. The infection was so advanced that hundreds of maggots had infested the wound.
- **Outcome:** Despite initial hopelessness, the Trust provided 8 months of intensive treatment and nursing. The patient was discharged fully healed and healthy.

Case 2: Saving a Limb from Amputation

- **Patient:** Ganga Dasi Ji (65 years old).
- **Condition:** A poisonous insect bite led to a massive infection and a 5-inch deep wound on the arm, exposing the bone.
- **Medical Intervention:** Three surgeons recommended immediate amputation of the arm.
- **Outcome:** The Trust committed to 9 months of specialized care. The arm was saved, and the patient regained full physical use of her hand.

Case 3: Complex Surgical Care

- **Patient:** Ajay Maurya Ji (40 years old).
- **Condition:** Severe **Gangrene** in the left arm. Initial tests also indicated the presence of **Cancer**.
- **Intervention:** After a referral to Lucknow Medical College and family consent, life-saving surgery was performed.
- **Outcome:** The patient recovered successfully and was discharged.

1	Jay Hanuman Das Ji (80 years)	Suffered a severe Shoulder Fracture .	Successfully treated with a plaster cast and full rehabilitation care.
2	Shri Ram Shankar Das Ji (74 years)	Suffering from chronic pain and stones in the Back, Gallbladder, and Kidneys .	Underwent 3 successful operations and is now completely healthy.
3	Group Case: Sages & Destitute	Multiple elderly individuals suffering from various infections and age-related ailments.	Provided residential care and free diagnostics (CT Scans/MRI) leading to recovery.
4	Geeta Devi Mata Ji (80 years)	Suffered a fall resulting in a Hip (Kulha) and Leg Fracture .	Provided surgical intervention and plaster; recovered fully after 3 months of care.
5	Shivam (Divyang) (20 years)	Found on the street with no home; suffering from severe physical deformities (Asthavakra) and extreme pain.	Provided 2 months of intensive personal care, hygiene, and medical support.
6	Sohan Kumar Maurya (12 years)	Severe infection in the right leg with massive swelling and 3-4 kg of pus inside the limb.	Provided emergency drainage and treatment to save the leg and the child's life.
